

FIVE KEY TAKEAWAYS

1. Exposing yourself to diverse situations that require you to be flexible and adaptable and creative can help prepare you for managing through uncertain times - now and next time.

3. You also have that power in your personal life. You can choose to play your own game instead of playing the game that everyone else is playing and the game that everyone expects you to play.
