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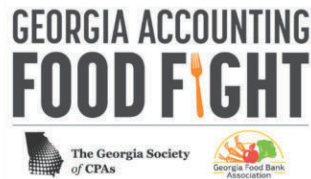

Randy, an Army veteran, showed up at a recent food distribution after hearing about it from a friend. Before the pandemic, he was a cook at a local restaurant and was laid off once everything started shutting down.

“My sister was working to take care of us--me, her and her son. It was humiliating for my kid sister to be working [to provide for us]. She could pay the bills, but there was nothing left over for food, gasoline. I put the lawnmower gasoline in the car to get up here. I didn’t know how we were going to eat or anything. And this is just going to tide us over until I get my first paycheck.”

Randy was able to get unemployment for a short period of time. When the benefit was gone, he had to pawn many of his personal items. Thankfully, Randy just started a new job in the kitchen of another local restaurant the day before the food distribution. Due to a back injury, Randy has a hard time standing for long periods of time and goes to the VA for physical therapy, but he’s hopeful to work his way back up to a 40 hour workweek.
